Walks will continue through the holiday period!



ART APPRECIATION GROUP NOVEMBER 15th





Bernadette had arranged for Carolyn Conroy to

give the Group a presentation on Simeon Solomon at the last meeting and she gave us a fascinating insight into his life and work. Unusually he started off with a great deal of promise and ended his life rather sadly. Few of us had heard of him before.

Born in 1840 into a Jewish family of artists and something of a child prodigy, he followed his parents, Mickail and Catherine, brother Abraham and sister, Rebecca into the world of Art. To the disappointment of his parents he was not interested in the 'narrative painting' style that they followed with success but instead became interested in the Pre Raphaelites through a group of rebel painters who's hero was Gabriel Rosetti. They were also interested in Medieval Art.

Simeon 's work became very popular during the 1860s when he enjoyed considerable success and painted biblical subjects under the influence of Rosetti sometimes useing darker skinned models to illustrate Old Testamount characters. These included "Mother of Moses" and "Finding of Moses". Around 1864, members of his group of friends included: George Ray, an art collector and Algerine Swinbourne the poet, ('Love of art for art's sake'). At his peak in the 1870s Simeon produced much of his best work including: "A vision of Love Revealed in Sleep and "Love dreaming by the Sea" in 1871.

Sadly in 1873, at the height of his popularity, he was arrested for gross indecency in a public toilet and sentenced to eighteen months prison, later suspended. Deserted by his friends and Victorian Society he spent some time in an asylum before turning to alcohol while living on charity and a meagre income from selling reproductions of his work. He continued to draw although he was no longerable to afford paint and

spent some years in St Giles Workhouse in London prior to his death in 1905.



His work has been recognised more recently when, in 2005-6, his work was highlighted in an exhibition at the Birmingham Museum & Art Gallery, "Love Revealed: Simeon Solomon and the Pre –Raphaelites". It was also shown at the Ben Uri Exhibition, London and the Museum Villa Stuck, Munich.

Shakespeare North Playhouse, Prescot.

Thirty six members of our U3A spent an hour and a half being shown around the New Shakespeare Theatre at Prescot on Thursday November 2nd. It was a really interesting day, starting with a coffee before being divided into two groups led by our separate guides.



We learnt that the theatre is very much a Community venture with lots of different activities taking part there, including, play reading and writing, children's sessions, wardrobe and set design, pottery, (a potter helps children and young adults to make Elizabethan type money boxes, some of which are displayed and each is a little different from the others!) There is an outdoor 'amphitheatre style' area in memory of Ken Dodd and backed by his widow. A variety of performances are staged there, weather permitting. The theatre has a real Community feel to it.

Of course the 'jewel in the crown', so to speak, is the actual theatre built in Elizabethan style using solid oak and old building methods and materials, (apart from the very modern metal electric light fittings up in the lighting gallery). It is a 'theatre in the round' but can be adapted for use as a proscenium stage. The photos below will give you some idea. Ed.

November 9th "History of Parkgate"

Anthony Annekin-Smith delivered an excellent talk on Parkgate. I think most of us learnt something new about an area familiar to us. Anthony described the people

and buildings that were around in the early 18th Century, the ships that sailed to and from Parkgate bringing in goods and ferrying people to Ireland and back. Only the smaller ships could tie up next to the road, larger ones anchored further out and were rowed to shore.

He also gave us the history of some of the older houses and described how, in the late eighteen hundreds, the burgeoning town became a magnet for people looking for sea and sand. As we know the area was also popular for cockling. This of course was before the sea gave way to marshes and the river, silted up, no longer allowing the passage of ships.

I believe that Anthony has several other talks in his repertoire so perhaps we might see him again. He is certainly a knowledgeable and entertaining Speaker. Ed.
