Merseyside and Cheshire Blood Bikes

Presented by Kirk Phillips

I'm aware of the 'blood bikes' having spotted them out on the roads but I never realised their riders were volunteers. That impression was put straight during our first speaker meeting on this year on 4th January when the talk was given by Kirk Phillips, the chairman of Merseyside and Cheshire Blood Bikes.



We learned about the MCBB which is a non-profit making charity providing support to the NHS. The group transports urgently needed breast milk, tissue samples, medical equipment as well as blood supplies, between laboratories, patients, hospices, milk banks and various NHS departments across Merseyside and Cheshire. All done free of charge!

Set up in 2012 the group now has 100 volunteers who give their time in roles including riding the bikes, manning the phones, and providing essential support. The charity needs £35,000 a year to run – most of which is spent on fuel. Those BMW motorbikes I've seen (and they have 8 of them along with a van) cost £17,000 each to buy and put on the road. Along with specially adapted panniers and high visibility markings, speed and position trackers help to ensure safety of the riders and those unusual cargoes.

They assist with 6000 runs yearly between places from Wirral to Warrington to Chester to the border with Shropshire, including St John's Hospice, Countess of Chester and Arrowe Park Hospitals, Clatterbridge Cancer Care both in Wirral and in Liverpool. Previously taxis provided this service with their corresponding charges but the charity believes that providing their couriers for free has saved the NHS £250,000.

Kirk spoke of his pride that MCBB was given the Queens Award for Voluntary Service in 2018. Currently they need volunteers for various roles and full training will be provided including being 'buddied' with an experienced volunteer. It certainly

seems a worthwhile cause - helping the NHS save money, assisting sick people and premature babies.



As Kirk said, 'I'm just going out for some milk' can certainly take on another meaning. I'll look at those bikes and their riders in a different light when I see them again.

Before leaving this well attended meeting, we queued to donate via the very popular collection tins. The MCBB Facebook pages state that this collection amounted to £281 - which they thought was amazing.
