BRIAN'S MUSINGS

In May we make the leap from spring to high summer, when nature appears to be at its best. With human beings, whatever the season, one might be justified in assuming that such a leap has yet to be made. What exactly is our best? Science assures us that we are still evolving. I am very glad to hear it. You know where you are with a packet of seeds as they often come with a nice picture on the packet but if on the packet it said that the plant was still evolving and we are not sure what it will end up like, we might think twice before committing ourselves to attempting to rear it.

I can remember when we had Maypoles. Of course their use was limited to children of Primary School age to avoid any complications that might develop should their original function as symbols of fertility ever be realised; especially given that any child conceived on May-Day-Eve would belong to the fairies. More importantly, Maypoles embodied the creative struggle and tension that ensues whenever energy attempts to take on form. The Large Hadron Collider at Cern is devoted to research into this very issue. A Maypole would have been considerably cheaper. As a psychologist I have spent some time and energy trying to identify some of the basic patterns to which we might conform either to our detriment or to our advantage and trying to untangle the strings before one can even begin. I do not doubt that the patterns are there, (we refer to them as algorithms now-a-days) but I do doubt how we identify and define them and am saddened by our reluctance to leave spaces for new patterns to emerge. It's a good thing that U3A can offer us a very viable collection of algorithms to be going on with.

VISIT TO WEAVER HALL MUSEUM AND THE LION SALT WORKS 20 APRIL 2017

The Weaver Hall Museum on the site of a former workhouse had many exhibits showing not only how life was like in The Workhouse, but also how the extraction of salt led to further industrial development, the increase of the use of canals and waterways, which gave work both in the local villages and increased trade with The Commonwealth.



The Lion Salt Works which closed in June 1986 is now a popular venue and the tour has access to the Stove House and Pan Houses. This was the Country's last traditional open-pan salt making site.
