

Saint George Patron Saint of England Aril 23rd

On April 23rd in England we celebrate St. George, Patron Saint of England since the 12th century when Edward 111 created the Order of the Garter. This was many years after his death in 303. He was widely invoked during the Crusades as an aid to battle and was a popular saint as his reputation for holiness and virtue spread across Europe in the 9th century.

He was born in Cappadocia, now part of Turkey, to father Gerontius, a Christian Greek serving in the Roman army. His mother, Polychronia, came from an area that is now part of (Palestine) Israel.

St. George never visited England and little is known for certain about his life, though he is Patron Saint of several countries as well as England, including Georgia and is venerated as one of the auxiliary saints. Tradition holds that he was a Roman soldier who was tortured and decapitated under Dioclitian's persecution of Christians in 303.

The dragon is thought to represent the devil. St. George offered to slay the dragon if the citizens consented to convert to Christianity and be baptised. Fifteen thousand men, including the King of Silene converted and George then killed the dragon with his sword. The corpse was then carried out of the city on ox-carts.

St. George's Day used to be a Bank Holiday celebrated with parades, dancing and flags flying. Red roses are sometimes worn in the lapel. Perhaps we could revive some of the old customs – happy St. George's Day!
