Why "TOCK-TICK" Does Not Sound Right in Your Ears.

So you can have a lovely little old rectangular green French silver whittling knife. But if you mess with that word order in the slightest you will sound like a maniac."

That explains why we say "little green men" not "green little men" but "Big Bad Wolf" sounds like a gross violation of the "opinion (bad)-size (big)-noun (wolf)" order. It will not though, if you recall the first rule about I-A-O order. That rule seems inviolable:

"all four of the horse's feet make exactly the same sound, but we always say clipclop and never clop-clip".

This rule even has a technical name, if you care to know it: the rule of ablaut reduplication. But then life is simpler knowing that we know the rule without knowing it.

VISIT TO THE WALKER ART GALLERY ON OCTOBER 20TH

Bernadette organised visit to the Walker Art Gallery to view an exhibition of 'Sickert: A Life in Art' Exhibition on October 20th. It was very well supported and proved most interesting as few of us were really familiar with his work















which started in the late nineteenth century and continued until a few years before his death in his eighties, in 1942. He was a prolific painter and a well regarded one. Born in Munich, Germany, his family moved to England in 1868 when he was a child. He also worked in France and Venice. He worked as an apprentice to Whistler who became a great influence in his work together with the French artist Degas.

Sickert was a radical painter who wanted to capture a changing society as he saw it; including the bad as well as the good and he frequently reinvented himself. He belonged to the Camden Group of artists whose aim was to reflect the realities of modern urban life through art. In 1926 he married his third wife, Therese Llessore, also an artist of repute whom he had known for a considerable time and who looked after him as his health started to fail in his final years. Many of his later paintings were copied from photographs which she had taken.

The earlier paintings on show seemed very dark, though perhaps the ones painted of the Music Hall audiences were indicating a darkened auditorium and some of the Venice ones indicating the approach of nightfall. Later paintings were much lighter in tone. The Walker Gallery holds one of the largest collections of his sketches and work.

Thank you Bernadette for organising a most interesting visit.
