It was a well-attended AGM and after the refreshments and chatting we settled down to hear how we were doing. Margaret, our treasurer gave a summary of accounts and Alan gave the Chairman's report. Thomas Brassey Railway Builder Extraordinaire

David Casement, a member of The Thomas Brassey Society, gave a fascinating talk about Thomas Brassey, and proved me wrong in thinking that this was a subject I wouldn't find interesting! A surveyor and railway engineering contractor, born in Buerton in 1805, Brassey was descended from a Cheshire landowning family. At age 16, he became apprentice to William Lawton helping to survey the Shrewsbury to Holyhead road (now the A5). He must have impressed his master because at 21 he became a partner



in the firm of "Lawton and Brassey" and moved to Birkenhead where their business was established. From managing Storeton Hill quarries and building the Saughall Massie bridge locally - he went on to build numerous bridges, viaducts, stations, sewers. docks systems and locomotives. His list of works beyond Britain is extremely impressive and includes the Grand Trunk Railway in Canada, a railway to assist the movement of troops in the Crimean War, and most of the network in France. Employing 85,000 men, he was described as empathetic, kind, modest, honest and honourable - he paid his navvies a fair wage and was admired and respected by his workforce.





By the time he died in 1870 he had built a quarter of British railways and 5% of the world's railways (leaving behind a substantial fortune) enabling the global expansion of railways and infrastructure, shaping transportation across continents – a truly great Victorian.

A huge thank you to David for reminding us all what an amazing man Thomas Brassey was. He achieved so much, lived locally and yet so few of us knew him. Good luck to the Society's fundraising efforts for a statue of Brassey to be erected at Chester Station as a testament to his remarkable contributions.

Living in Panama 1963-72 Joyce Woosley

Along with her methodist minister husband David, and their children, Joyce lived in Panama for 9 years and her talk described their life living and working in Central America when it was far from the tourist destination it has become. Because of its' strategic importance, the U.S. had control of the Canal Zone – extending for 5 miles on each side along the 50 miles of canal connecting the Pacific to the Atlantic Ocean. The U.S. had formidable military installations there. Residents in the Republic couldn't use the shops, libraries, cinema, or hairdressers in the Canal Zone. As a result of which much resentment was felt towards them.



Joyce covered everything from politics (the anti-U.S. and then anti-government riots), to living in such hot and rainy weather - pouring kerosene around table legs to keep the bugs at bay and having heated wardrobes to keep clothes dry. She spoke of travelling by canoe and raising her family in sometimes dangerous surroundings, and the surprising pros and cons of having bilingual children. Her description of Panama as being 'vibrant and fascinating' was matched by the photographs and local goods Joyce sent round the audience - giving us the opportunity to examine the handicrafts and workmanship of the Panamanian peoples.

Joyce's background as a teacher stood her in good stead for starting off this season of social meeting talks and she

As part of the celebrations for the 200th anniversary of the National Gallery's foundation, 12 of the nation's most iconic and well-loved paintings are being lent to 12 venues across the UK. 12 simultaneous exhibitions are opening on the same day – 10 May 2024 – at 12 museums and galleries with The Walker Art Gallery displaying 'The Rokeby Venus' by Velazquez. Bernadette talked about Velazquez in a very enjoyable, and well attended meeting of the Art Appreciation Group. She discussed various periods of his work, with examples on display on the large screen but also with high quality copies in books she had brought along for us to examine. Her talk was with particular interest in his painting of the Spanish royal family, the masterpiece, 'Las Meninas'.
